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To the citizens of Erie County:

Respectfully submitted for your review is the annual report for your Erie County Sheriff's Office for calendar year 2015. This report covers in detail the activity generated as we carried out our varied statutory and public service duties and responsibilities throughout the year.

Your Sheriff's Office consists of three divisions: the Patrol Division, comprised of Patrol Deputy Sheriffs, Detectives, and Communications Officers; the Jail Division; and the Civil Division.

A brief review of the information contained in this report reveals the following interesting statistics for each division of your Sheriff's Office for 2015:

- We received 26,848 classified calls for service, a decrease of less than 1% from 2014. Unfortunately, major crime statistics increased. While it was not necessary for us to investigate any homicides, and the number of reported rapes, robberies, and felonious assaults were similar in number to those reported in 2014, we saw a marked increase in the number of burglaries and breaking and enterings.
- Other overall law enforcement efforts by your Sheriff's Office resulted in sworn personnel serving 1089 arrest warrants and making 1,016 criminal arrests. Our traffic enforcement efforts resulted in 98 impaired driving arrests and the issuance of 1,341 traffic citations and 2,412 traffic warnings. We also investigated 750 traffic crashes. Our detectives opened 445 investigative case files and closed 344 investigations during the year.
- Communications officers were very busy, as always. They answered a total of 40,714 calls through the 911 system and approximately 200,000 calls on non-emergency lines.

- Civil Division efforts resulted in the service of 4806 writs (subpoenas, protection orders, and other forms of civil process directed to the Sheriff for service) and the sale of 393 properties through court-ordered Sheriff's Sales. The Civil Division also coordinates sex offender registrations and the issuance of concealed handgun licenses. We registered 398 sex offenders and issued 1378 concealed handgun licenses during 2015. Since 2002, the number of sex offenders registered by the Sheriff's Office has increased over 23% and the number of concealed handgun licenses issued in 2015 showed a decrease of 22% over 2014.

- Corrections Officers were extremely busy in the Erie County Jail. A total of 3515 arrestees were booked into the county jail. The average daily jail population was 131 inmates.

Other information of interest for 2015 for your Sheriff's Office includes the following:

- Two employees—Deputy Sheriffs Sgt. Steve Hammersmith and Mark Paule retired during the year. Sgt. Hammersmith was the day shift patrol supervisor for many years prior to his retirement and Deputy Paule was the commercial truck weight enforcement deputy. Best wishes to them for healthy, enjoyable, and well-earned retirements.

- We continued to maintain Sheriff's Office substations in Margaretta, Groton, Oxford, Huron, Milan, Berlin, Vermilion, and Florence Townships. The existence of these substations allows for our Patrol Division Deputy Sheriffs to report directly to assigned areas of patrol throughout the county at shift changes—rather than reporting to the Sheriff's Office as a group—greatly reducing response times to calls for service and increasing our agency's visibility and crime prevention efforts throughout the rural areas of the county. These substations would not be possible without the cooperative relationships that we continue to enjoy with the township trustees in all of the townships throughout the county.

- Due to the continued cooperation and support of educators in the Edison and Margaretta Local School districts, and with the financial support provided by Dave and Margaret Rudolph through funds collected in memory of their son during the Brad Rudolph Memorial Scholarship Golf Scramble, Deputy Sheriff Chad Henderson continued to instruct the DARE program to students in both school districts.

- Due to the continued cooperation and support of educators at the EHOVE Career Center, Deputy Sheriff Nick Mazur, followed by Deputy Sheriff Tony Dauch continued to provide school resource law enforcement services at the school throughout the academic year. This was the thirteenth consecutive year for this program.
- Due to the continued cooperation and support of educators at Firelands College of Bowling Green State University, Deputy Sheriffs Ed Wimmer and Mark Jacobs continued to provide year-round primary law enforcement services throughout the campus. This collaborative program has been in place for many years.
- Due to the continued cooperation and support of educators at North Point Educational Services Center (NPESC), Deputy Sheriff Keith Bodi, followed by Deputy Sheriff Scott Gezzer continued to provide school resource law enforcement services at NPESC's facility housed in the former Adams Junior High School in Sandusky.
- Due to the continued cooperation and support of Erie County Engineer Jack Farschman, Deputy Sheriff Mark Paule, followed by Deputy Sheriff Nick Mazur, continued to perform commercial motor vehicle weight enforcement duties throughout Erie County.
- Due to the cooperation and support of the Erie County Commissioners and the Erie County Department of Job and Family Services (JFS), Deputy Sheriff Greg Hall continued to be assigned to JFS to concentrate on the service of arrest warrants issued in cases relating to child support issues.
- Due to the continued cooperation and support of the Huron Township Trustees, we were contracted to provide four Deputy Sheriffs and one Communications Officer to provide law enforcement services and supplemental dispatching services within Huron Township.
- During the year, we entered into a joint contract with Townsend Community School (TCS) and the Margareta Local School District to provide full-time law enforcement services at TCS. Deputy Sheriff Alexis Harvey has been assigned to this school resource deputy role.
- Due to the cooperation of the Erie County Common Pleas Court, the Erie County Adult Probation Department, the Erie County Commissioners, and the Erie County Solid Waste District, the Sheriff's Office Community Service Program was reactivated. Deputy Sheriff Keith Bodi is the coordinator of this program, which allows for those

sentenced by a court to perform community service, probationers, and non-violent Erie County Jail inmates to complete routine general maintenance tasks for political subdivisions and non/not-for-profit entities throughout the county. In exchange, the community service workers receive credit toward their fines, court costs, and/or jail time.

- We continued to provide emergency public safety dispatching services to political subdivisions throughout Erie County. Along with dispatching Sheriff's Office personnel and acting as a message relay point for other county offices, we also dispatched the following agencies: Sandusky Police and Fire Departments; Perkins Township Police and Fire Departments; Huron Police and Fire Departments; Bay View Police and Fire Departments; Kelleys Island Police, Fire, and EMS Departments; Erie Metroparks Rangers; and the Margaretta Township, Groton Township, and Vermilion Township Fire Departments. We also began dispatching the Berlin Heights Police Department during 2015. The Sheriff's Dispatch Advisory Board, chaired by Huron Police Department Chief Bob Lippert and comprised of the chiefs of the public safety agencies that we dispatch for, continued to provide collaborative input concerning administrative and operational issues pertinent to their dispatch operation.

- We provided mutual aid assistance to law enforcement agencies throughout the county on over seven-hundred (700) occasions. We also continued to host monthly meetings of police chiefs throughout the county, along with attendees representing law enforcement agencies from various local, state, and/or federal agencies. These meetings allow for direct communication and information sharing between these law enforcement professionals.

- As part of our agency's ongoing effort to utilize technology to combat criminal activity, Detective Sergeant Dennis Papineau received extensive training in the use of devices to download evidence—many times crucial to the solution of a criminal offense—from cellular telephones. While this service was previously available, there was in many instances a delay of several weeks before that information could be received. Detective Sergeant Papineau is now able to download this information in many instances within a few hours. We have made Detective Sergeant Papineau's services available to any local law enforcement agency in the region and he has processed—and will continue to process—cell phones for those agencies.

- We continued to provide primary law enforcement response to calls for service at Erie Metroparks properties throughout the county in 2015.

- With the outstanding support and cooperation of Lions Clubs throughout Erie County, we continued Project Lifesaver throughout the county. Project Lifesaver provides equipment that can assist in locating those individuals with cognitive disorders who wander from their caregivers. Deputy Beth Beatty was the

original coordinator for this program for our agency; upon her retirement Deputy Ron Schnittker assumed that role.

- We continued to work cooperatively with the members of the Erie County Commission, the Erie County Administrator, and all other state, county, and local officials in an effort to provide the most effective and cost-efficient law enforcement services possible to our constituents throughout the county. We would also like to thank the County Commission for the allocation of funds in 2015 that allowed for the completion of numerous ongoing maintenance improvements at the Sheriff's Office—including the repaving of the parking lots, floor refinishing, and the upgrade of the fire alarm and security systems.
- Our agency's first K-9 in three decades—Butch—was diagnosed as suffering from a congenital spinal disease and we were necessarily forced to retire him from active duty, based upon a recommendation from our veterinarian. Butch's ownership was transferred to his handler, Deputy Sheriff Dan Orzech, and we hope that Butch will be able to live out the rest of his days in relative comfort with Deputy Orzech's family. We look forward to placing a new K-9 on patrol, with Deputy Orzech as the handler, in 2016.

In summary, while unique in many ways, 2015 was a typically busy year for your Sheriff's Office. While statistics alone can be useful, they do not—and cannot—reflect the true devotion to public safety that the staff members of your Sheriff's Office demonstrate while performing their day-to-day duties under what can only be described as, at best, difficult conditions. Whether the individual is a Communications Officer, a Corrections Officer, or a Deputy Sheriff, our personnel strive to, on a daily basis, conduct themselves ethically, professionally, and in a dignified fashion, regardless of the situation that may occur. They are the most valuable asset that we have.



PATROL DIVISION OVERVIEW

Chief Deputy Jared L. Oliver supervises the Patrol Division of your Sheriff's Office. He has a number of years experience with the agency, having served as a Corrections Officer, Patrol Division Deputy, and Detective, Detective Sergeant, and Detective Lieutenant. He graduated from the 242nd Session of the FBI National Academy in 2010, and was promoted to Chief Deputy Sheriff on June 1, 2012.

Chief Deputy Oliver is the second-in-command of your Sheriff's Office. In the event that Sheriff Sigsworth is absent or unavailable, Chief Deputy Oliver commands the entire agency.

The Patrol Division is composed of Patrol Deputy Sheriffs, Detectives, and Dispatchers.


During 2015 Patrol Deputy Sheriffs totaled twenty seven in number, exclusive of contract positions and three deputies assigned to the Detective Bureau.

Also during 2015, your Sheriff's Office provided four Patrol Deputy Sheriffs at the Erie County Courthouse to provide security for Common Pleas Court personnel in the courtrooms and throughout the building. Those deputies also conducted prisoner transports between the Courthouse and the county jail, and between other facilities throughout the state and the county jail, and provided security and supervision for those transported prisoners.



ARRESTS BY MONTH 2015



TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED 2015



JAIL DIVISION OVERVIEW

Lieutenant Thomas “Casey” Proy is the Erie County Jail Administrator and he oversaw the operation of the Erie County Jail in 2015. He was responsible for the operation of the only jail facility in Erie County. In addition to the Jail Administrator, the jail is staffed by twenty five full-time, and a number of part-time, Corrections Officers, and a part-time Administrative Assistant.

Prisoner meals are provided under contract by the Aramark Corporation, and that company operates the jail’s in-house kitchen. Based upon an average daily jail census of 131 prisoners during 2015, a total of 143,445 meals were served. The average cost of each meal is \$1.35.


Jail nursing services are provided every day by contract with the Erie County Health Department, and jail physician services are provided by contract with Northern Ohio Medical Specialists (NOMS).

The operation of the Erie County Jail received satisfactory reviews by the members of the Erie County Grand Jury, who routinely inspect the jail as part of their statutory duty.



BOOKINGS BY YEAR



CIVIL DIVISION OVERVIEW

Administrative Captain Steve Westcott supervises the Civil Division of your Sheriff's Office. He is a former Perkins Township Police Department patrol officer and sergeant, a former Erie County Common Pleas Court adult probation officer, a former employee of the Erie County Auditor's Office, and began his employment with the Sheriff's Office as the Assistant Jail Administrator in January 2001.


The Civil Division is responsible for all civil, fiscal, payroll, personnel, records, sex offender registration, concealed handgun license, background check, and grant reporting duties of your Sheriff's Office. During 2015, Captain Westcott supervised three full-time Administrative Assistants, one Deputy Sheriff, and one part-time Administrative Assistant.

LICENSE ISSUANCE BY YEAR

In April of 2004 Ohio's Concealed Carry Law became effective. In the nine months of 2004 that Ohioans could carry concealed handguns, the Erie County Sheriff's office issued 508 licenses. The graph below illustrates the number of licenses issued since the 2004 Concealed Carry Law became effective.

FISCAL/CIVIL DIVISION STATISTICS

SEX OFFENDERS

The Ohio Legislature enacted Ohio Revised Code Chapter 2950, the Sex Offender Registration law, in 1997 known as Megan's Law. This law requires persons convicted of specified crimes and has designated them as a Sexual Predator, Habitual Sex Offender or Sexually Oriented Offender, to register with the Sheriff of the county in which they will reside. This registration procedure takes place upon release from a term of imprisonment or, if not imprisoned, then upon moving into a county after conviction.

Starting in January 1, 2008 the Adam Walsh Act was implemented in Ohio. It changed the structure of how the offenders were classified. The Tier System was implemented with Tier I Offenders being the least serious class and Tier III Offenders being the most serious class. Community notifications are performed on Tier III Offenders that had notifications performed under the old law.

In June of 2010 the Ohio Supreme Court ruled in State v Bodyke that the Ohio Attorney General had no authority to reclassify Sex Offenders who had already had a Judicial Hearing under Megan's Law. As such, all Megan's Law classified Sex Offenders were changed back to their original classification.

In 2015 a total of 12 Sexually Oriented Offenders were removed from the registry after their registration requirements expired. Also in 2015 a total of \$125.00 in registration fees were collected, 398 registrations were performed, and 212 follow up investigations were performed with 10 arrests being made.
